Who Are We?

In 1987, civil war drove an estimated 20,000 young boys from their families and villages in South Sudan. Wandering for years, they walked more than 1000 miles, half of them dying before making it to a Kenyan refugee camp. The survivors of this tragic exodus became known as the Lost Boys of Sudan. Today, there are approximately 200 Lost Boys in the Nashville area.

The Lost Boys Foundation's mission is the reunification and enhancement of the lost boy community. The Lost Boys Center in downtown Nashville is a gallery and studio space funded by the foundation to provide a community of support to the Lost Boys living here.

The artwork on display at Third Coast Clay was created by Lost Boy artists and proceeds from any sales will benefit the Lost Boys Center.
